FORWARD

We are pleased to present the fourth issue of the Annual Report on Port State Control in the Mediterranean region which is published under the auspices of the Port State Control Committee of the Mediterranean MoU.

The 2008 Port State Control Report outlines regional PSC performance and activities during the year, as well as international perspectives on port State control and is evidence of the member Authorities concerted efforts to maintain maritime safety and marine pollution prevention on vessels operating in the Mediterranean region.

2008 was an active year for port State control in the Mediterranean region. The 10 members of the agreement have carried out 6317 inspections. The number of detentions has dropped slightly from 921 in 2007 to 629 in 2008. While cautiously welcoming the drop in the detention results, the Mediterranean MoU member Authorities believes that the battle against substandard ships will continue.

OVERVIEW

General Introduction:

This Annual Report is published under the auspices of the Med MoU committee on PSC. This annual report is the fourth issue and covers port State control activities and developments in the year 2008.

In accordance with the provisions of the Memorandum, the Authorities which have signed and formally accepted the Memorandum or which have been accepted with unanimous consent of the port State control committee would become full members currently; the Memorandum has 10 full members namely: Algeria, Cyprus, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Malta, Morocco, Tunisia and Turkey.

The Port State Control Committee established for Monitoring and controls the implementation and on-going operation of the Memorandum.

The Committee consists of representatives of the member Authorities and also observers from the maritime Authorities and the inter-governmental organizations which have been granted observer status by the committee, namely: International Maritime Organization (IMO), International Labour Organization (ILO), Paris MoU, the Black Sea MoU and Abuja MoU. The Secretariat of the Memorandum is located in Alexandria, Egypt and its Information Centre in Casablanca, Morocco.

For the purpose of the Memorandum, the following instruments are the basis for Port State Control activities in the region:

- * The International Convention on Load Lines, 1966;
- * The International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, 1974 (SOLAS 74);
- * The Protocol of 1978 relating to the International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, 1974;
- * The International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships, 1973, as modified by the Protocol of 1978 relating thereto (MARPOL 73/78);
- * The International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watch keeping for Seafarers, 1978 (STCW 78);
- * The Convention on the International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, 1972;
- * The Merchant Shipping (Minimum Standards) Convention, 1976 (ILO Convention No. 147);



THE PORT STATE CONTROL COMMITTEE

The Memorandum of Understanding on Port State Control, in the Mediterranean region was finalized on the basis of the third preparatory meeting in Malta in July 1997. At the end of the Meeting the Mediterranean MOU on PSC was signed by the Representatives of eight Countries: Algeria, Cyprus, Egypt, Israel, Malta, Morocco, Tunisia and Turkey.

Late 1997 the Med. MOU was signed by Lebanon & in July 1999 by Jordan.

The 1st Committee Meeting was held in Alexandria, Egypt (24-26 Feb. 1998).

The 2nd Meeting was held in Istanbul, Turkey (14-16 Oct.1998).

The 3rd Committee Meeting was held in Limassol, Cyprus (6-8 Oct.1999).

The 4th was in Valletta, Malta (14-18 July 2001).

The 5th was in Limassol, Cyprus (26-28 March 2002).

The 6th Committee Meeting was in Aqaba, Jordan (7 -10 Oct. 2003)

The 7th Committee Meeting was in Alexandria, Egypt (31 -2 Feb. 2005)

The 8th Committee Meeting and the First Joint Session with the Black Sea MoU was in Istanbul, Turkey (17-21April2006).

The 9th Committee Meeting and the First Extra ordinary meeting was in Istanbul, Turkey (27-28 November 2006).

The 10th Committee Meeting was in Casablanca, Morocco (29-31 October2007).

The 11th meeting was scheduled to take place in Jordan on the 5 – 7 January 2009 and was regrettably postponed due to the security situation in the area in that time.

The eleventh meeting of the Port State Control will be held in Malta from 9-11 November 2009.



CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER REGIONAL PORT STATE CONTROL AGREEMENTS

There are nine regional port state control agreements (MOUs) covering the major parts of the world, namely:

- Paris MoU
- Vina del Mar Agreement
- Tokyo MoU
- Caribbean MoU
- Mediterranean MoU
- Indian Ocean MoU
- Abuja MoU
- Black Sea MoU
- Riyadh MoU

In support of the inter-regional collaboration on port state control, Med MoU holds observer status of the Paris MoU, Black Sea MoU and Abuja MoU. In a similar manner, Med MoU has granted observer status to the Paris MoU, Black Sea MoU and Abuja MoU.



Med MoU has inter-governmental status (IGO) since 2006 in IMO meetings and attends the meetings of the Flag State Implantation (FSI) Sub-Committee since that date.

The Med MoU Deputy Secretary participated in the MSC 84 that was held in May 2008 and in the MSC 85 that was held in November 2008.

Med MoU has maintained effective and close co-operation with the Paris MOU both at administrative and the technical levels. During the period of 2008, continuous efforts and further coordination were made.



The Paris 47th Port State Control Seminar

Port State Control Officers from the Mediterranean MoU attended the 47th Port State Control Seminar that was held on 9 -11 December 2008 in Oparjia - Croatia joining participants from Black Sea MoU and the Paris MoU.

TRAINING AND SEMINARS FOR PORT STATE CONTROL OFFICERS

One PSC officers was invited by IMO from the Med MoU region attended from 30 June to 18 July 2008, the eighteenth basic training course for PSC officers that were held in Yokohama, Japan. The course was conducted by the Shipbuilding Research Center of Japan (SRC).

The basic training course aims to provide junior or newly recruited PSC officers with necessary knowledge on maritime conventions and essential port state control procedures and requirements. Apart from the classroom lectures, onboard trainings were conducted in Yokohama and Nagoya in order to gain practical experience on PSC inspections.

MED MOU INFORMATION CENTRE (CIMED)

- CIMED and Equasis have finalized a Data Exchange agreement. This agreement will be signed in the very near future upon technical /financial readiness of CIMED.
- CIMED and Lloyd's Register Fairplay (LRF) signed an agreement since April 2007 and was approved by the Med MoU Committee to exchange data.
- A development of data exchange protocol between IMO and the CIMED for reporting of PSC inspections will be signed according to the Committee decision No. 262.
- For the purpose of harmonization, Med MoU has established links with the BSIS of the Black Sea MoU. According to the Med MoU/BSMOU joint declaration, the CIMED and BSIS Managers had agreed on schedules of exchange of data between the two regimes.






Number of inspections

Detentions in % of inspections








Number of inspections with deficiencies






Number of detention




Number of ships detained






MoU inspection %




MoU's effort / member Comparison

Number of Inspections, Detentions, Inspections with deficiencies






Number of Inspection per major Ship type






Number of detention per major Ship type






Number of deficiencies per major Ship type
