## FOREWORD

*We are pleased to present the fifth issue of the Annual Report on Port State Control in the Mediterranean region which is published under the auspices of the Port State Control Committee of the Mediterranean MoU.*

*2009 was an active year for port State control in the Mediterranean region. The 10 members of the agreement have carried out 6,966 inspections. The number of detentions increased slightly from 629 in 2008 to 707 in 2009. In these 12 years the Mediterranean Memorandum has gained remarkable experience in eliminating sub-standard shipping.*

*International reports stating that more than 75% of all accidents and dangerous incidents can be attributed to the human factor. This has particularly will be taken into account for the elaboration of any new concept of the "inspection procedures".*

*The mutual co-operation with the International Maritime Organization, Paris MoU and Black sea MoU in the field of port State control should be mentioned. The benefit of this relationship is enormous. The IMO has participated in the meetings of the Med MoU on regular basis since 1998.*

*The Med MoU would like to record its appreciation to the European Commission for its support through the SAFEMED II project and to Rempec its implementation body and appreciation also goes to other MOUs.*

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## OVERVIEW

### General introduction:

This Annual Report is published under the auspices of the Med MoU committee on PSC. This annual report is the fifth issue and covers port State control activities and developments in the year 2009.

In accordance with the provisions of the Memorandum, the Authorities which have signed and formally accepted the Memorandum or which have been accepted with unanimous consent of the port State control committee would become full members currently; the Memorandum has 10 full members namely: Algeria, Cyprus, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Malta, Morocco, Tunisia and Turkey.

The Port State Control Committee established for Monitoring and controls the implementation and on-going operation of the Memorandum.

The Committee consists of representatives of the member Authorities and also observers from the maritime Authorities and the inter-governmental organizations which have been granted observer status by the committee, namely: International Maritime Organization (IMO), International Labour Organization (ILO), Paris MoU, the Black Sea MoU and Abuja MoU. The Secretariat of the Memorandum is located in Alexandria, Egypt and its Information Centre in Casablanca, Morocco.

### **For the purpose of the Memorandum, the following instruments are the basis for Port State Control activities in the region:**

- \* The International Convention on Load Lines, 1966;
- \* The International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, 1974 (SOLAS 74);
- \* The Protocol of 1978 relating to the International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, 1974;
- \* The International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships, 1973, as modified by the Protocol of 1978 relating thereto (MARPOL 73/78);
- \* The International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watch keeping for Seafarers, 1978 (STCW 78) as amended;
- \* The Convention on the International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, 1972;
- \* The Merchant Shipping (Minimum Standards) Convention, 1976 (ILO Convention No. 147);



## THE PORT STATE CONTROL COMMITTEE

The Eleventh Committee Meeting was held in Valletta, Malta from 9 to 11 November 2009. The meeting was hosted by Malta Maritime Authority. The meeting was attended by the representatives of the member Authorities of Cyprus, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Malta, Morocco, Tunisia, Turkey and observers from IMO, EC (represented by REMPEC), Paris MoU, Black Sea MoU (represented by Turkey delegation), Riyadh MoU and the U.S. Coast Guard.

### **Important outcomes of this meeting:**

- The Committee has decided to establish the Management Advisory Board (MAB).
- The Committee has granted the Paris MoU an observer status which will further increase co-operation among two organizations.
- The Committee has approved the exchange programme between the Med MoU-BS MoU 2009 for PSCO's.
- The Committee instructed the Secretariat to continue communication with Syrian Maritime Administration to clarify information needed for approving Syrian membership to the Med MoU.



- The 12<sup>th</sup> Committee meeting of the Med MoU on PSC is scheduled to be held in November, December 2010.

### **MED MOU INFORMATION CENTRE (CIMED)**

- The Committee approved in principle the draft agreement with IMO to define mutual undertakings of data exchange between the Med MoU and IMO and authorized the Med MoU Secretary General to sign the agreement in its final form.
- The committee noted the achievement made on data exchange between Med MoU and Black Sea MoU and instructed the Information Center to maintain and improve that achievement.
- The Committee noted the progress on data exchange with Equasis.

### **CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER REGIONAL PORT STATE CONTROL AGREEMENTS**

Med MoU has inter-governmental status (IGO) since 2006 in IMO meetings. The Med MoU Deputy Secretary participated in the MSC 86 that was held from 27 May to 5 June 2009.

The 11<sup>th</sup> Committee meeting was held at the same time and venue that the IMO held a Regional Workshop for PSC Officers for the Mediterranean MoU in Malta.

#### **The Fourth IMO Workshop**

The Fourth Workshop for Port State Control MOU/Agreement Secretaries and Directors of Information Centers was held from 28 to 30 January 2009 at the IMO headquarters. The Med MoU was represented by its Chairman who chaired the Workshop and its Secretary General. Representatives from the regional PSC agreements and observers from some flag States and industry participated in the workshop. The major issues discussed at the workshop were IMO activities related to PSC, update on activities and decision by the regional PSC agreements, development of regional information systems and training activities.



## CO-OPERATION WITH PARIS MOU

Med MoU has established and maintained an effective and close co-operation with Paris MoU, at administrative and technical levels. Representative of the Paris MoU (Deputy General Secretary) attended the 11<sup>th</sup> Med MoU Committee meeting in Malta. During the period of 2009, continuous efforts and further coordinated actions by the two Memorandums were made.

### **The Paris 49<sup>th</sup> Port State Control Seminar**

Port State Control Officers from the Mediterranean MoU attended the 49<sup>th</sup> Port State Control Seminar that was held from 1 to 3 December 2009 in Helsinki – Finland. Med. MoU participated in this seminar.

### **5<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Maritime Safety Sub-Group of the Euro Med Transport Forum Maritime Transport Working Group**

The SAFEMED Project Progress Meeting was held in Brussels on the 23 June 2009 and was chaired by REMPEC in its capacity as the implementing body of the Project. The meeting was attended by representatives of the following SAFEMED Project beneficiaries:

Algeria, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Morocco, Tunisia and Turkey. The EC, EMSA, IMO, Med MoU on PSC and CETMO attended the meeting. The meeting stressed the importance of cooperation among the beneficiary countries themselves, and noted the SAFEMED II Project activities and urged beneficiaries and other stakeholders to commit themselves to offer co-operation. The report of the meeting was presented in the 11<sup>th</sup> Committee meeting.

## COOPERATION WITH TOKYO MOU

The nineteenth basic training course for PSC officers was held in Yokohama, Japan, from 29 June to 17 July 2009. This was the fifth joint training course organized by IMO and Tokyo MOU. Five PSC officers from Abuja MOU, the Viña del Mar Agreement, Caribbean MOU, Indian Ocean MOU and Mediterranean MOU were invited from the IMO. The Maritime Authority of Jordan participated in the course as a representative of the MED MoU.



## ANNUAL STATISTICS REPORT 2009

In the following annual statistics the facts and figures of 2009 are listed. The figures show an increase in the number of inspections, deficiencies and slightly increase in the number of detention.

### INSPECTIONS

With a total number of 6,966 inspections performed in 2009 the inspection figures showed an increase of 649 inspections (10.3%) compared with the figures of 2008.

The greatest contribution for inspections was from Egypt with 2,124 inspections then from Turkey with 2,044 inspections.

The greatest percentage of inspections was on the "General cargo/multipurpose ship" which was 3,420 inspections (49% of all inspections).

### DEFICIENCIES

#### **Number of deficiencies (26,891):**

In 2008 the number of deficiencies recorded was 25,234 deficiencies, in 2009 this number increased to a total of 26,891 deficiencies 6.6% compared with 2008. The average number of deficiencies per inspections decreased from 4 in 2008 to 3.8 in 2009. The greatest portion of deficiencies recorded was in "Safety of navigation" with 25.26% of total number of deficiencies, then "Propulsion and auxiliary machinery" with 9.66% of total number of deficiencies.

#### **Number of ships with deficiencies (4,110):**

"General cargo/multipurpose ship" recorded the greatest number of deficiencies which is 2,445 deficiencies (60% of total number of ships with deficiencies).

### DETENTIONS

The detention figures showed an increase in the number of detentions till 2007 then it decreased to record 629 in 2008 and made slightly increase to record 707 in 2009. The average detention rate in 2009 is 10.15% which is lower than 2004 which showed a detention rate of 14.54%.

The greatest percentage of detentions was on "General cargo/multipurpose ship" which is 557 detentions (79% of total number of detentions).












### Number of detentions



### Detentions in % of inspections











Number of Inspections, Detentions and Inspections with deficiencies per member state


### Number and % of inspection, deficiencies and detention per ship's type


